Not sure how this satisfies three of the CLOs: Critical-Interdisciplinary Thinking, Diversity, and Active Societal Engagement. But it can assess the Christian Orientation CLO. Doesn't link these to larger departmental or college PLOs.

Mostly but doesn't have the Westmont specific language about linking CLOs with larger college or departmental criteria.

+There are significant differences between OT syllabi in respect to the CLOs that should receive careful departmental review. Although the RS-010-3 syllabus needs to directly link CLOs to assessment methods, it is obvious from the CLOs themselves and the assignments that the course is indeed assessing these outcomes.

^{**} I think so, but am not sure. I'm especially concerned about one part. The syllabus reads, "We hope you will sharpen your critical faculties as you learn to interpret the OT by raising historical questions..." While this states the certification criteria, there is no way to measure the "raising of historical questions" through any area of course assessment, which is only multiple choice exams and class attendance (not participation).

- @ This syllabus is exemplary in linking CLOs to college and departmental PLOs. All other RS CC syllabi would benefit from using this as a model.
- ^ Mostly, but there are a lot and no sense of how they connect to college or departmental PLOs and how they are measured.
